COURSE CATALOG

DEGREE PROGRAM PLAN FORM

Before a student can exceed 12 semester hours (including TESOL Certificate students) a master's degree Program Plan Form must be completed; see sample forms in the appendix. Please make an appointment with your academic advisor to complete the form and obtain the required signature. The forms for the M.A. degree and TESOL Certificate are available online HERE via the Office of the Registrar. Questions about the forms should be directed to registrar@wheaton.edu.

COMPREHENSIVE EXAM OR MASTER'S THESIS

The comprehensive exam (Comps) is a 0-credit, pass/fail exam taken during your final semester in the program. Register for the exam (LING 692) as you would for a course on your Wheaton Portal the semester you plan to graduate. It is designed to test your knowledge of the core required courses for the MA program. At the beginning of the semester, you will be notified by the program director concerning the exam schedule, the preparation work required, and due dates. Most students report that they enjoy the chance to review and integrate all that they have learned during their time in the program. In lieu of taking the comprehensive exam, some students choose to write a Master's thesis (LING 698/699). This is a good option for those who are interested in researching a topic in depth, but most students choose to take the comprehensive exam. Talk to your advisor during your first semester if you are interested in writing a thesis.

EXIT INTERVIEWS

We need your help! The purpose of the exit interview is for you to give helpful feedback to the department on the strengths and limitations of the TESOL and Intercultural Studies programs. How do you do that? Students must have an exit interview with their advisor during the last two weeks of the semester in which you graduate.

TERM DATES

ONLINE OR RESIDENTIAL SECTIONS

Occasionally a course may have two sections, one held on-campus for residential students, and one online for flex/fully remote students. When you register, you can see which is the online section as it will have the OL designation in the section column ("Sec") with the time and location listed as TBA. All online courses are run asynchronously unless otherwise noted. Please note: Residential students are expected to enroll in the on-campus section unless they have an urgent need (e.g. scheduling conflict for a required course) to enroll in the online section, and need permission from their academic advisor to do so.

The MA in TESOL and Intercultural Studies is a 36-credit-hour degree program which includes 4 hours of electives. These electives allow you to personalize your degree program by taking courses that appeal to your interests and future goals. To complete the elective requirement, you can select from courses offered through the department, or you may take approved courses offered by other graduate departments. It is also possible to take a 300- or 400-level undergraduate class for graduate credit if you are on campus and have the professor's permission. You should discuss elective options with your advisor near the beginning of your time in the MA program.

INTERNSHIPS

Local Internship Opportunities

TESOL MA students who are new to the profession may want to gain more teaching experience than a practicum field placement can provide. To receive credit for an extended internship, students can register for LING 696 as an elective course for 2 or 4 credit hours. Local internships involve a semester of assisting/teaching in a local ESL program. For example, World Relief's education department offers a year-long internship (combined with the TESOL practicum) in their ESL programs in Wheaton and Aurora. This can be a paid internship when combined with work-study. Additional internship opportunities can be arranged with the ESL program at the Pui Tak Center in Chicago and with local community college ESL programs (College of DuPage, Waubonsee Community College, Harper College). These local internships are also popular options during the summer session, along with the overseas internships. Please see Dr. Alan Seaman for more information: Alan.Seaman@wheaton.edu

International Internships

The department has long-term connections with a number of schools and summer programs throughout the world for practicum field placements and internships. Please consult with the internship coordinator for a specific list of opportunities. Residential students who plan to travel abroad must apply to the Global Programs and Studies department for approval. Students who are based abroad (TESOL Flex) may be able to use participation in local programs for internship credit, with departmental approval.

Internship Requirements:

To receive 2 or 4 semester hours of credit for LING 696, the TESOL internship, the student must:

1. Complete **80 hours of work** as a teacher (or in another teacher's classroom) in an agency under the supervision of an approved administrator (**160 hours** for a 4-credit-hour internship);

(The 80/160 hours described above can include activities such as attending meetings, preparing lessons, serving as an aide in the classroom and some co-teaching);

- 2. Maintain a journal which records both the hours worked and reflections on the experience;
- 3. **Meet (in person or by videoconferencing)** with a Wheaton College TESOL professor to report on progress in the internship;
- 4. Write a paper (@ 12-15 pages in length) which includes
 - a. insights from the internship and goals for the future,
 - b. a **description of the** teaching situation.

Students who register for LING 696 must also fill out an internship application which is available through the Registrar's office at Wheaton College.

Teaching Expectations:

In some cases, the intern will be the main teacher of an ESL class, responsible for preparing the lessons and delivering instruction. In most cases, the intern will be present in another teacher's class and will assist instruction in a variety of ways. *Because of the variety of programs sponsoring internships, the teaching expectations are flexible*. The intern is expected to participate in the ESL class (or classes) on a regular weekly schedule, primarily as an aide, but also with some co-teaching later in the term. The amount of co-teaching will be determined by the intern and cooperating teacher.

Requirements for an English as a Second Language Endorsement/Approval in Illinois

Teachers wanting to work as specialists in English as a Second Language (ESL) or bilingual education (BE) in Illinois public schools must earn an endorsement or approval that is recognized by the state. Here are the current requirements for an ESL endorsement/approval.

- 1. A valid Illinois teaching certificate.
- 2. ESL clinical experience equal to 100 clock hours or three months teaching experience with ESL students.
- 3. Credits totaling 18 semester hours distributed among the following course areas:
 - Linguistics
 - Theoretical Foundations of Teaching ESL
 - Assessment of the Bilingual Student
 - Methods and Materials for Teaching ESL
 - Cross-Cultural Studies for Teaching LEP Students

Advice for TESOL Students

The TESOL program at Wheaton has a strong relationship with both secular and Christian agencies and institutions, in the Chicago-area and internationally. Here are some suggestions for growing professionally during your time here:

Join International TESOL and Illinois TESOL-BE. The international association of Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) has over 15,000 members and holds a major convention each year. You can join TESOL at a special student rate and begin to receive publications such as TESOL Connections and TESOL Quarterly. The state affiliate of TESOL, Illinois TESOL-BE is a very active organization which you can join separately at a student rate. Each year Illinois TESOL-BE hosts several Saturday workshops and a statewide convention in the Chicago area. Wheaton TESOL students have been very active in this organization, attending the events and presenting papers. You might consider attending the annual convention in late February (itbe.org).

Get Involved with an ESL Classroom. We strongly encourage all of our graduate students to get involved in local ESL classrooms as volunteers during each semester that they are in the program.

Consider Part-Time ESL Employment After One or Two Semesters. A number of local programs hire Wheaton TESOL students as part-time instructors once they have completed a semester or two of study. Your faculty advisor will have information about local programs and will guide you with advice about the job search process.

Use the Professional and Curriculum Libraries Located at Wheaton. Over a thousand TESOL curriculum and professional/academic books are in <u>Buswell Library</u>. The TESOL curriculum books (those intended for use in classrooms) are located in a special section (ask a librarian if you need help locating them). A number of professional books (intended for teachers) are also in Buswell, and a different set of professional books can be found in the 400-428 section of the stacks. Several hundred books are also located in our resource room-library, BGH 213, and may be checked out for brief periods of time.

A NOTE ON ICCT

The <u>Institute for Cross-Cultural Training</u> (ICCT) offers intensive training workshops and courses that can be used for credit towards the certificate or degree programs. All workshops and courses are offered online throughout the year. The SLA course is a wonderful opportunity for those pursuing summer elective credits. You can take some incredibly useful courses, learning alongside international workers and church leaders.
